I hope that your answers to these questions are yes.


This year we only spent money on absolute necessities; meaning we did NOT buy any archival safe storage supplies, we did NOT upgrade our computers, we did NOT repair the roofs that are leaking, etc. Even without those important expenses, we will still spend approximately \$122,000 by the end of this year. Your county taxes provides us with \$80,000. This means to just keep the Museum open we need \$42,000 in donations each and every year.

YOUR donations determine what YOUR Museum looks like to the world! The only way we can keep improving YOUR Museum is with YOUR donation. So far this year we have received \$27,250 from generous donors and members. This means we still need to raise another \$15,000 to make it through this year. The parade started at the school grounds and came South on the street west of Main Street. They turned east and came past the fire station and then turned and headed North on Main Street. It was long enough that the first entries were back at the school before the last entries had left the school grounds.

Kenny Knoettgen narrated the parade. His narration went very well until we blew a fuse in the fire station, where Kenny's PA system was plugged into. The problem was corrected and he continued to describe the floats, cars, tractors and trucks as they went by. What a colorful fun parade! During those years, the children of the Morganville community held a bike a thon for St. Judd's Hospital every year.

The kids who had ridden in the St. Jude's Bike A Thon were at the front of the parade. The "Urban Clan" had several floats in the parade. I think I saw Alvin fishing in a row boat with some grandkids. Some of the Urban men were chopping wood and the women were washing, rocking babies and having fun. There was even someone coming out of an outhouse! The Urban Clan was well represented at that parade.

The Morganville Fire department had men riding in a trailer and pretending to play musical instruments. They had a tape recording of music in the truck that was actually playing the music. I know those men and they were much better at fighting fires than they were at playing instruments. There was also a German band riding in a trailer and playing songs. August Koelling, 96 years old, four years younger than the town, was driving an older tractor.
