A BRIEF HISTORY

This year we are celebrating the 5th year of the Grand Opening of your downtown Museum and the 50th anniversary of the Clay County Historical Society. I thought it might be beneficial to highlight some of the events in the Museum's and the Society's history.

The first attempt to form the Clay County Historical Society occurred in May 1940. However, before it could get officially started, World War II began and the effort was discarded. The Society was finally and officially created in August 1972. The Society then created the Clay County Museum within the old City Hospital building in 1975.



Most artifacts collected at the beginning came from the Clay Center Library Club which had acted as an unofficial historical society for several years. By the end of 1975, the Museum's collection had 367 artifacts and 628 documents. Throughout the next few decades, the collection would grow by the hundreds each year and in 1993, the Clay County Commissioners passed a resolution allowing the Historical Society to store non-current Clay County records.

It was decided in 2011 the old City Hospital building no longer had enough space to comfortably house our evergrowing collection. Thanks to Cathy Haney, the Society was able to purchase the Orr's Furniture City building and warehouse downtown. The future of the Society and Museum were looking promising, and then things changed in 2016.

MUSEUM MEMOS

In June of 2016, we lost Cathy Haney. There is not enough room to say what Cathy meant to this Museum and this community. She is the reason our Museum is where it is today. In her honor, the Historical Society Board voted to officially name our research area, The Cathy Haney Research Library. After Cathy's passing, I took over as Museum Director.

Then the Historical Society attempted to get an initiative placed on the ballot in 2016. If passed, the initiative would have raise public support from \$50,000 to about \$110,000. Unfortunately, it failed to make it on the ballot. Things became worse when we lost the current funding from the County. However, the Clay County Commissioners stepped forward and found another way to support the Museum. The public of Clay County now supports the Museum with \$80,000 per year.

Finally, 2016 was also the year the Clay County Commissioners notified the Historical Society that they needed the Museum out of the old City Hospital by early January of 2017. Frantic packing of the Museum began in early December.

With the help of several local volunteers, Kings Moving & Storage from Junction City, and Americorp Group from Colorado, moving started on January 9th, 2017 and was complete ten days later. Despite the hardships of 2016, the first floor of the Museum was ready for the Grand Opening during Piotique of 2017.

After dwindling interest and lowered volunteer numbers, it was decided in 2018 to discontinue hosting large special events like Pioneer Festival. Museum still wanted to provide small events for the community, so February 2019, through the State of Kansas Attorney General, we obtained our 1st traveling exhibit, the Magna Carta. In September of 2020, we rented our 2nd traveling exhibit, Imprinting the West: Manifest Destiny. Real Imagined just in time for the grand opening of our second floor exhibits. Unfortunately, COVID-19 had everything shut down and we were unable to celebrate the occasion.

We are slowly getting back into things in the aftermath of COVID. Visitor numbers are slowly starting to pick back up. We're also receiving lots of donations to the collection.

A DAY AT OUR MUSEUM

A normal day at the museum is one of unpredictability. One may come in the door with the thoughts of putting an artifact description in the spreadsheet, but soon be sidetracked with another project that pops up.

The day can begin with sharing what may have happened the evening before or the morning we walk in. There is also holding discussions of what needs to be done to better the system we use. Sometimes it's deciding how to better show the community how we keep track of the information that we have found while researching the county.

The next thing you know we are doing a follow up to see how much background we can gather that is within our walls.

We usually have at least one person call or email a day asking for information or help with genealogy. Sometimes this can take as little as half an hour but the possibility is that two hours can go by faster than a person realizes. When things are starting to slow down for the day, usually a half hour before quitting time, you finally have the time to do what you had originally set out to do that morning.

With this being an average day, in the last few month we have done research on: several buildings in Clay Center, several citizens of Clay Center, the Clay Center City Fire department and how the trophies and banners were won. A story is coming soon on the first 40 years of our Fire Department.

We have also received donations from four different estates recently that contained wonderful pieces of Clay County's heritage.


